

## **Guidelines for Panel and Colloquy Moderators and Presenters**

- Sessions are 85 minutes long. Do not wait for a crowd to form. Start promptly!
- Reserve at least 20 minutes for open discussion.
- **Panelists** have 12–15 minutes depending on size of panel. If a panel has five papers, each presenter has 12 minutes. If a panel has three or four papers, each presenter has 15 minutes. It is best to plan on 12 minutes regardless of the size of your panel since last-minute changes in the panel could affect your allotted time. Reading of papers is not acceptable.
- Moderators are primarily responsible for introductions, keeping the time, and alerting presenters of remaining minutes, as well as managing the open discussion period. Each room contains one-minute and five-minute "warning" signs that moderators may use to alert presenters of the time remaining in their presentations. Moderators are expected to maintain an atmosphere conducive to open and collegial discussion of ideas. They are not discussants. However, each moderator is responsible for making a brief introduction (one minute) of each paper. IMPORTANT: Please do not re-order the sequence of papers as they are listed in the program. Many conference participants plan their attendance of a session based on the order of the papers.
- If a moderator does not arrive, we ask that the first presenter take on this role.

#### **Some Definitions**

**Colloquy**—Formal discussion of an issue. Presenters make prepared comments and engage in an open discussion with the audience. They do not, however, present written papers or indepth research findings. Instead, speakers draw upon their general knowledge, background, and experience of the issue being discussed.

**Panel**—Formal exploration of an issue through the presentation of papers followed by open discussion by presenters and the audience.

*Roundtable*—Informal discussion of an issue over breakfast. The discussion is open to anyone who wishes to join in and share his or her views.

# Highlights of UAA's Organizational History

The history of the Urban Affairs Association began in the context of the momentous era of the 1960s. In the aftermath of the turbulent summers of social unrest in America's urban centers, a wave of initiatives was launched to address the compelling problems of cities. One distinct set of efforts involving urban researchers was funded by the Ford Foundation. The Foundation's efforts had two primary objectives: "1) to promote research on a wide range of urban problems by scholars from a variety of disciplines and 2) to encourage closer contact between university scholars and city decision-makers in order that research results could be directly applied to the ills of the city." Between 1959 and 1974, the Foundation expended over \$36 million in seeking these objectives. One outgrowth of the grants made to various universities and colleges was the development of several urban research and outreach centers. Some of the directors of these centers formed a group that became known as the Council of University Institutes for Urban Affairs (CUIUA). The first meeting of CUIUA took place in Boston Massachusetts on November 13, 1969. An official constitution and bylaws were drafted and approved. The council agreed that the first annual meeting of the organization would take place in Washington, D.C. in April of 1970.

#### Selected Moments in Organizational History

#### April—1970

CUIUA approved that a committee be formed 1) to identify various alternatives open to the Council in assuming a clearinghouse role in the dissemination of information on urban affairs, and 2) to present to the Board a proposal at the next meeting of the Council.

The first Chairman; Vice-Chairman; Secretary-Treasurer; Membership Committee, and Advisor to Membership Committee appointed.

#### November-1970

Two Council members asked to undertake incorporation of Articles and By-laws under the laws of the District of Columbia.

#### April—1972

Resolution unanimously adopted regarding the need for a secretariat that would "a) serve as a clearing house, b) develop a publications program, c) provide technical assistance to universities and urban affairs centers, d) maintain liaison with other professional, educational, and public interest organizations, and e) facilitate research consortia composed of university urban affairs centers."

#### December-1972

Board unanimously adopted a resolution that the principal office of business of CUIUA shall be the Division of Urban Affairs, University of Delaware, Newark, DE.

#### June-1980

Board agrees that the most important function of CUIUA is to provide a network for all urbanists, regardless of discipline or affiliation.

#### March—1981

Institutional Membership voted 19 to 1 at the Annual Business Meeting to change the name of CUIUA to the Urban Affairs Association.

Board voted to affiliate CUIUA with a journal; it would explore how to begin this process with the editors of 'The Urban Interest' and 'Urban Affairs Papers.'

#### October-1981

Board unanimously approved Letter of Agreement between the UAA and the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University for the editorship of the *Journal of Urban Affairs*.

#### June-1986

Board unanimously voted to select the University of Louisville as the co-sponsoring institution for the *Journal of Urban Affairs*.

#### October-1989

Board voted 11 to 1, with 1 abstaining, to recommend changing the bylaws so that institutional and individual members had equal voting rights in the Association and so that Board membership was equally open to both institutional and individual members.

#### April—1999

Board unanimously agreed that the UAA should sign a five-year contract with Blackwell Publishers to publish the *Journal of Urban Affairs*.

#### March-1995

Board unanimously votes to contribute support for the European Links Committee's first two newsletters and other linkage-building efforts. Subsequent support helps to establish the European Urban Research Association.

#### May-2000

Board agreed to provide financial support for the development and launch of an intranet (Cyberhood-a "virtual coffee house").

Mary Helen Callahan resigns from the Executive Director position after 25 years of service.

#### July-2008

Scott Cummings concludes highly successful 17-year role as Editor of *Journal of Urban Affairs*.

#### September-2008

Board approves recommendation to accept proposal from the University of Delaware for hosting the Secretariat for the period 2010-2015.

#### January-2009

UAA begins new 7-year contract with Wiley-Blackwell for publication of *Journal of Urban Affairs*.

# UAA Establishes Distinguished Service Award to Honor of Mary Helen Callahan

The UAA Governing Board has established a new permanent award that celebrates the distinguished service and leadership of Mary Helen Callahan, Executive Director of UAA from 1980 until 2000. Ms. Callahan will become the first recipient of the award during the upcoming Annual Meeting in Honolulu. The award will be given on a periodic basis to an individual who has provided an outstanding record of service to UAA and/or the field of urban affairs.

As the first recipient, Ms. Callahan personifies the purpose of the award. For more than twenty years she provided the essential administrative leadership that maintained the UAA Secretariat at the University of Delaware. A native of Alexandria, Virginia, Ms. Callahan spent most of her formative years in Little Rock, Arkansas. She began her work for UAA in 1975 after having attained her AB (magna cum laude) in History at Radcliffe, and her Master of Arts in Teaching at Harvard. As administrative assistant (from 1975-1980) to the board chair of what was then the Council of University Institutes for Urban Affairs (later renamed the Urban Affairs Association), she played a central role in establishing the early operational infrastructure and board support that helped to launch a new national professional organization. She was instrumental in building the core activities of the organization from its annual conference to its now well-respected Journal of Urban Affairs. As the guiding hand in UAA's development for more than two decades, Ms. Callahan epitomizes the commitment and service to the field of urban affairs that this award seeks to honor.

The award will be presented during the Friday, March 12, Awards and Recognition Luncheon at the Waikiki Sheraton Hotel.

# Reclaiming the City: Building a Just and Sustainable Future

Rebuilding efforts--in New Orleans, Port au Prince and other parts of the world--provide an opportunity to examine the paths selected for public policy and private investment, and how these decisions shape the future of urban places. Six years after the devastating effects of Hurricane Katrina, New Orleans is in the midst of a large-scale rebuilding effort and redefinition of place. Powerful dynamics at the local, regional, national and international levels filter various values and interests to yield a powerful development logic. This logic determines the nature of change, its impacts, and most importantly, who benefits and who ultimately pays. New Orleans provides a dramatic and significant context to examine the processes and outcomes of change. However, developmental change in New Orleans has much in common with transformative processes that occur in other urban places. Critical perspectives suggest that change and transformation of cities across the globe, increasingly favors private capital, large institutions, and visitors. This bias poses certain challenges to the possibility of building a just and sustainable future for cities. The conference is an invitation to consider a broad range of concepts and strategies for rebuilding that can yield urban futures that are both equitable and sustainable. The challenges embedded in seeking such futures are significant. The conference will seek to identify ways to overcome those barriers while *reclaiming the city*.

# Proposal Deadline—October 1, 2010

Proposals can be submitted for papers, panels (a group of 3–5 formal papers with moderator), colloquies (formal discussions without papers), breakfast roundtables (informal discussions) and posters. UAA Conference policy limit participants to one presentation/session role per annual meeting. Do not submit multiple proposals. However, participants can be co-authors on multiple papers. Proposal submissions are accepted only on-line at the UAA website. You do not have to be a member of UAA to submit or participate in the conference. There are no fees for proposal submissions. However, if your proposal is accepted, you must register and pay registration fees associated with your membership category (e.g., member or nonmember or student).

Proposal Decision Date: Acceptance or rejection notices will be sent by November 15, 2010.


