
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A B O U T U A A

MISSION

The Urban Affairs Association (UAA) is dedicated to creating interdisciplinary spaces for engaging in intellectual and practical discussions about urban life. Through **theoretical, empirical, and action-oriented research**, the UAA fosters diverse activities to understand and shape a more **just and equitable urban world**. (Adopted March 12, 2010)

HISTORY

UAA is the successor organization to the Council of University Institutes for Urban Affairs, formed in Boston in 1969 by a group of directors of university urban programs. As urban affairs developed as a professional and academic field, the need for an organization that welcomed **urban faculty, professionals, and students as well as urban program directors and deans** became increasingly apparent. In recognition of this need, in 1981 the organization's name was changed to the Urban Affairs Association.

Today, UAA's membership includes close to 1000 individuals, and students from colleges and universities throughout North America, South America, Europe, Africa, Australia, and Asia. Among its other activities, UAA sponsors the ***Journal of Race and Ethnicity***, which serves as an outlet for ground-breaking theoretical and empirical approaches that explore race, ethnicity, identity and social justice, and the ***Journal of Urban Affairs***, a refereed annual journal, publishing manuscripts related to urban research and policy analysis of interest to both scholars and practitioners. All UAA members receive both journals as part of their membership fee as well as discounted pricing for **year-round professional development opportunities**. UAA also sponsors **Upsilon Sigma – The Urban Studies Honor Society**. Upsilon Sigma is dedicated to recognizing and encouraging excellence in scholarship, leadership, and engagement in urban studies and related fields. The mission is to promote academic excellence and enrich the educational experience of undergraduate and graduate students pursuing degrees related to urban studies.

The Urban Affairs Association hosts a **conference each spring in an urban center**. Recent conferences have taken place in Miami, San Diego, Minneapolis, Toronto, Canada, Los Angeles, Washington DC, and Nashville. These yearly conferences are an integral part of UAA's efforts to increase knowledge about urban places and promote the development of research activities. They provide an excellent opportunity for members to exchange ideas, information, and experiences. The conference program features both topics of institutional concern and those related to urban issues. Each year, formal research papers are presented, with selected papers published in the *Journal of Urban Affairs*. Additionally, the conference format allows opportunities for informal activities designed to foster professional networking and open discussion.



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ABOUT EURA

HISTORY

The European Urban Research Association (EURA) was launched at an international conference held in Brussels, Belgium in September 1997. The inspiration for this association originated in discussions proposing the creation of a new association for urban researchers at an international seminar on 'Shaping the Urban Future' held in Bristol, England, in July 1994.

Almost 25 years have passed since that very day, and EURA is now entering into adulthood, aiming to consolidate its agenda and aspirations. Over the last decade greater attention to urban issues has been visible at an international level. On the one hand, the process related to the Quito conference, under the responsibility of UN habitat in 2016, and on the other, the new attention to the urban dimension under the current EU cohesion policy (made explicit with the Riga Declaration and the Pact of Amsterdam), make the EURA agenda even more challenging. In this globalised context, academic multi-dimensional and interdisciplinary urban debate is needed more than ever. As is cross national research and policy exchange. EURA has, throughout this time, strongly supported the necessity of debating the need for a European urban policy. Now that there is growing awareness and engagement at both international and EU level with this perspective, it is crucial that academics engage in this debate, producing innovative and challenging ideas and research.

AIMS

EURA wishes to play an active part in shaping this Urban agenda, as a network able to promote innovative research design, exchange of knowledge and knowledge transfer. We feel EURA has a critical role to play, in particular, refocusing on its original idea of offering a bridge between research and policy. Researchers are anxious to help policy makers support integration, cohesion, and collaboration in the area of urban policy, ambitions often difficult to achieve. Policy makers must in turn recognise that researchers have an important contribution to make. Our shared agenda about urban problems must be developed, explored, extended and indeed challenged. EURA aims to facilitate this exchange of ideas and to foster the transfer of good practice in urban research and policy.

Our journal, *Urban Research & Practice*, plays a key role in this regard and we look forward to new contributions, and to its continued growth and increased impact. Our Working Groups are another tool in that direction: we are keen to develop these and others and are willing to support them. For colleagues at the early stages of their careers our Young Scholar Award and the Summer/Winter Schools, are key supports.

In a more and more global research community, EURA is constantly open to refining and enhancing its future role and agenda, inviting young scholars and experienced colleagues to contribute to its activities. We look forward to welcoming new members and we thank all of those who are already contributing to our association.



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
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
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ABOUT ENHR

The European Network for Housing Research (ENHR) was established in 1988 to provide an organizational exchange platform for institutions and individuals in Europe (but also outside), who are actively engaged in housing research. The governing body of the network is the Coordination Committee formed by elected candidates and a General Assembly celebrated every two years where all members participate.

The main aim of the network is to scientifically enhance the quality and relevance of European housing research by

- Stimulating the extension and evaluation of methods for describing the housing situation and for measuring housing problems and needs.
- Promoting the assessment and development of theories concerning the linkages between institutional patterns, individual and collective action, and housing developments.
- Directing research attention to the complex interplay between market development and state intervention, both across time and among countries.
- Discussing the difficulties and struggles to preserve the right to housing for all.

The network currently comprises roughly 650 individual members and close to 75 institutional members, encompassing nearly every European country. ENHR is a platform for both new and experienced housing researchers as well as professionals to meet and discuss housing research approaches and methods, empirical results and evaluation of potential or existing housing policies and interventions.

The network is organized through permanent working groups (WG) devoted to jointly explore cutting edge housing research topics such as collaborative housing or housing for young people. 27 ENHR WG are currently alive, and a few are in preparation. Each WG has two or three WG coordinators and their members usually represent different geographical approaches and discipline sensitivities. Each working group normally hosts a workshop during the annual ENHR conference.

ENHR organizes an onsite major conference every year in a European city by active and engaged local hosts, usually universities or research centres. These conferences represent key moments for networking and knowledge sharing activities such as workshops, plenaries and fieldworks. Recently, ENHR has launched an online annual Seminar devoted to New Housing Researchers where presentations of PhD projects and research proposals take place receiving feedback from mentors commenting and suggesting ideas for clarification or improvement.

Housing researchers from Europe and other parts of the world find at the ENHR:

- opportunities to meet and discuss with other researchers,
- partners to elaborate research proposals,
- an online Newsletter four times a year to share their own publications and find information about current endeavours in the field.
- a supportive community to promote housing research further.



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MAKING HOUSING SYSTEMS WORK: EVIDENCE & SOLUTIONS

Housing is back on the political agenda in many European countries. Many countries are facing greater demand for housing than predicted a few years ago. Living in the existing stock is becoming increasingly expensive, partly due to poor insulation and high energy prices. Housing is hardly affordable anymore for young, low- and middle-income groups, especially in larger cities. Marginalization, segregation and affordability are therefore back on the political agenda.

The emphasis during the conference will be on how these problems can be solved. These solutions will be discussed from different perspectives during the six plenary meetings at the conference.

At the end of the conference, the debate from the Barcelona 2022 conference on the role of housing researchers continues: should they become housing activists or try to remain independent and provide insights and knowledge about the housing system?

The city of Delft will be the scene of the ENHR 2024 conference and the TU Delft Aula Conference Centre and the Faculty of Architecture and the Built Environment will be the venues.

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

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

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IN MEMORIAM

CHESTER HARTMAN

BRIEF BIO

Chester Hartman (1936–2023) was a pioneering equity planner, civil rights advocate, housing policy expert, writer, and scholar. He led campaigns against urban renewal and displacement, and advocated for a right to housing. He was a founder of Planners Network, and the Poverty and Race Research Action Council. He published over twenty books on urban planning, housing, and leadership. He earned his Ph.D. in City and Regional Planning from Harvard University, and has served on the faculty there as well as at Yale University, Cornell University, UC Berkeley, Columbia University, and George Washington University.

REMEMBRANCES

I treasured my relationship with Chester, built while serving as Board Chair of the Poverty & Race Research Action Council, the non-profit Chester led from 1989–2003. He showed bone-deep knowledge of the relation between systemic racial discrimination and persistent poverty. Though genial and soft-spoken, often mildly ironic, he was tireless in his commitment to change those centuries-old patterns.

Chester convened scores of scholars and activists nationwide while maintaining close ties with Congressional and executive branch leaders -- all the while editing PRRAC's quarterly and his own scholarly works, filled with ideas that touched thousands of activists and reformers across the nation.

John Charles Boger, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

As a graduate student in Cambridge, Chester showed me that grassroots activists, guided by solid analysis, could enact policies that protected renters and neighborhoods. Later, as a colleague and friend in San Francisco, we continued to work together on these goals and his and Amy's kitchen table at Elizabeth Street was always a shelter from the storm. Our pick-up basketball games earned him the moniker "Chet the Jet," showing that intensity and accuracy could overcome limitations of size. He inspired us all to be our best selves.

John Mollenkopf, City University of New York

Individual lives are short, but cities – and ideas of cities as the leading edge of progressive social change – are immortal. While progressive urban theory, planning, and organizing has lost a unique organic intellectual with the passing of Chester Hartman (1936–2023), his fight for true urban social justice amidst the urbanization of inequality lives on in the work of Planners Network, the Poverty and Race Research Action Council, and the mobilization of generations inspired by his writing. At first glance, Hartman's books and articles seem to be situated in a particular space and time – the United States in the second half of the twentieth century – but the bulldozer urbanism that Chester challenged as "clear 'em all out, put up a higher and best use" is becoming universalized in the transnational evolution of an urban planet. Now more than ever, we need to re-read Hartman's work as we struggle for a truly emancipatory urbanism.

Elvin Wyly, University of British Columbia

Chester was an invaluable mentor, and a better friend. He was simply a giant in his field in every way, professional and personal. Many will miss his intellectual contributions. I'll also always remember his annual July 4th and Hanukkah parties, which he found ironic given what he said was the limited influence of patriotism and religion in his life! The Washington DC community he left behind will never be the same.

Gregory Squires, George Washington University

Chester was an important and inspirational force in San Francisco in the efforts for affordable housing, including the fight to save the International Hotel and the movement for rent control.

W. Dennis Keating, Cleveland State University

Chester was a giant in his field, but always with a modest, unassuming manner. He was a gentle, generous friend, colleague, and mentor. He carved out a career as a radical planner in the service of a vision of social justice. Chester looked at urban renewal from the perspective of its victims, told their story, and then used his professional, organizing, and writing skills to challenge top-down planning. His combination of passion, persistence, political savvy, and professional skills helped change city planning for the better.

Peter Dreier, Occidental College

Chester was a leader in so many ways. He played a key role in broadening planning from its early physical orientation to a focus on race, income inequality, and housing affordability. And he was a major advocate of what was, in the 1960s, a wild and crazy idea: that community groups should have a voice in planning decisions! For me, personally, working with Chester on two co-edited books reinforced my understanding of the many ways that the private speculative housing market works against the needs of consumers, that housing must be seen as a human right, and that non-market-based strategies are fundamental to achieving that goal. Chester was a towering figure in our field, and he left a lasting imprint on how we think about planning education, our role as planners, and the centrality of a progressive housing agenda as a critical component of a humane and just society.

Filipe Teles is the current President of the European Urban Research Association (2021–2025). He is a Professor in the Department of Social, Political and Territorial Sciences, and Pro-rector for Regional Development and Urban Policies at the University of Aveiro, Portugal. Filipe's research focuses on local government, decentralisation reforms, political leadership and innovation. He recently edited the "Handbook on Local and Regional Governance" which was published by Edward Elgar in 2023.

Filipe is an expert/consultant on governance, decentralisation and subnational reforms with the World Bank, OECD, national governments, among others. In addition, he is a member of the Steering Committee of the Local Government and Politics Standing Group (European Consortium for Political Research) and of the Board of the Research Committee on Comparative Studies on Local Government and Politics (RC05) of the International Political Science Association.



RACHEL COUTINHO-SILVA

PONTIFICAL CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY OF RIO DE JANEIRO

Prof. Rachel Coutinho-Silva has an architecture degree from the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro, UFRJ, (1977), a master's degree in regional planning (1984) and a Ph.D. (1988) from Cornell University. She was a professor at the School of Architecture and Urbanism at UFRJ from 1992 until 2017. In 2018 she joined the Department of Architecture and Urbanism at the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio de Janeiro, (PUC-Rio). At UFRJ, she taught undergraduate and graduate courses, mentored around 150 undergraduate, master's and doctoral students. She is a fellow researcher at the National Scientific Research Council since 1995 and was a visiting scholar at the London School of Economics in 2008. She received the distinguished award Rio de Janeiro's Scientist of Our State.

Her contributions to the education in architecture and urbanism include the creation of the Graduate Program in Urbanism at UFRJ and the Undergraduate Program in Architecture at PUC-Rio. She develops research on gender, participatory processes and grassroots groups in favelas of Rio de Janeiro, and has worked in public agencies and NGOs as a planner. She was the Coordinator of Urban Planning at the Municipality of Rio de Janeiro (1997 to 2000).

Among her publications are the books: *Urban Challenges for Environmental Sustainability in Brazilian Cities* and *The City Inside Out: challenges of contemporary urbanism*, and the articles: "The role of women in solidarity actions in Favela da Rocinha, Rio de Janeiro" and "A radical strategy to deal with slum upgrading in the city of Rio de Janeiro".



KATHLEEN SCANLON

LONDON SCHOOL OF ECONOMICS

Economist and planner Kath Scanlon is Distinguished Policy Fellow at the London School of Economics, where she has been based for over 20 years. She specializes in researching the impact of housing policy at local and national level. Her work spans a range of housing-related topics: recent projects have looked at regulation of the private rented sector and the behavior of landlords; overseas investment in London housing; the wellbeing effects of living in cohousing; and the cost of temporary accommodation for homeless households. She recently completed a study of the financialization of housing in 13 cities across the globe, working with academics from each.



Kath is secretary of the European Network for Housing Research, the leading international forum for scholars of housing. She has conducted policy-focused research for a range of UK and international funders including the UK's Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, the Greater London Authority, several London boroughs, Homes for Scotland and the Council of Europe Development Bank. Her role involves regular engagement with civic groups and decisionmakers, and she has appeared before UK parliamentary committees and local governments to give evidence about her work. .

IVAN TUROK

UNIVERSITY OF THE FREE STATE

Professor Ivan Turok holds the prestigious South African DSI/NRF Research Chair in City-Region Economies at the University of the Free State. He is also Distinguished Research Fellow at the Human Sciences Research Council (South Africa), and Honorary Professor at the University of Glasgow (UK). He is former Editor-in-Chief of the journal 'Regional Studies', and currently Editor of 'Area Development and Policy', 'Development Southern Africa' and 'Urban Regeneration and Renewal'. Ivan was recently Chairman of the City Planning Commission for Durban for four years. Before returning to South Africa in 2010 to become Executive Director at the HSRC, he was Professor of Urban Economic Development at the University of Glasgow and Professor of Urban and Regional Planning at the University of Strathclyde (UK).



Ivan is an urban and regional economist/planner with over 30 years' experience. His expertise includes urbanization, economic development, affordable housing, local labour markets, agglomeration dynamics, land markets, spatial planning and urban policy. He is an occasional adviser to the United Nations, OECD, European Commission, World Bank and African Development Bank. He contributed to South Africa's Integrated Urban Development Framework and National Development Plan. He is the author of over 160 academic publications, journal articles, book chapters and books, many of which are highly cited.

GIVE ME YOUR TIRED, YOUR POOR, YOUR HUDDLED MASSES: FULFILLING THE PROMISE? THE MIGRANT CRISIS IN NEW YORK CITY

James DeFilippis' research focuses on the politics and economics of cities and communities. He is particularly interested in the processes of social change, and questions of power and justice in cities. His work strives to make connections; linking disciplines and connecting academic theory and grounded political practice. He has published work in academic journals in a variety of fields, both independently and in collaboration with other authors. He is the author or editor of six books and more than 40 articles and book chapters. Professor DeFilippis has also written applied monographs and reports, and his interests extend well beyond the academy and into the practice of concrete political work and policy analyses.



ANA MARIA ARCHILA
NEW YORK WORKING FAMILIES PARTY

Ana María Archila has been a leader in New York and nationally in the fight for immigrant rights, worker justice, LGBTQ rights, and women's rights for two decades. Born in Colombia, Ana María has spent her entire adult life in New York. She co-founded and led several grassroots progressive organizations, including Make the Road New York and the Center for Popular Democracy, and has dedicated her life to fighting for the rights and dignity of working people – Black, Latino, Asian, white, immigrant and native born.



In New York, she fought for years so that every young person would be able to access high-quality education--helping lead campaigns to fully fund public schools, create school-based college access programs, and pass the New York Dream Act. She was also deeply involved in the fights for paid sick days, raising the minimum wage, and a range of other economic, racial, and justice campaigns. In New York and nationally, she has been a leader in the fight for humane immigration reform.

She ran for Lieutenant Governor of New York in 2020 and led a remarkable effort; as a first-time candidate, she shaped the entire debate about the race and earned the votes of more than 200,000 New Yorkers in the Democratic primary.

Memorably, Ana María confronted former Arizona Senator Jeff Flake just before the Senate Judiciary Committee's vote for controversial Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh, leading to a delay in the process and forcing Flake and all Senators to reckon with their responsibility for allowing someone credibly accused of sexual assault to ascend to the Supreme Court. She joined Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez as a guest of honor at the 2019 State of the Union.

MURAD AWAWDEH

NEW YORK IMMIGRATION COALITION

Murad is a strategist, organizer, and advocacy expert currently serving as the Executive Director at the New York Immigration Coalition (NYIC). The son of Palestinian immigrants, Murad has dedicated over two decades of his life fighting for low-income communities of color across the State of New York. He grew up organizing to stop dangerous and hazardous developments in Sunset Park, Brooklyn, and engaging community residents to build power and bring transformational change to their neighborhoods. As the NYIC's Executive Vice President of Advocacy & Strategy he successfully led electoral, legislative, and policy campaigns at the federal, state and local levels, and mobilized hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers at demonstrations against anti-immigrant policies. As the Executive Vice President of NYIC Action, the NYIC's sister 501(c)4 political advocacy and action organization, he has successfully led grassroots electoral campaigns to elect progressive candidates. Murad has been featured in VICE and the Huffington Post, and was honored with a U.S Congressional Recognition, and Public Service Awards from the NYS Senate and Assembly. He serves as a Trustee of the New York University Family Health Centers Board, as a member of the Justice 2020 Committee, and as Commissioner of the New York City Civic Engagement Commission.



JOHN MOLLENKOPF

CUNY GRADUATE CENTER

Prof. Mollenkopf teaches Political Science and Sociology at the CUNY Graduate Center, directs its Center for Urban Research, and chairs the public policy subfield in political science. His teaching and research interests focus on urban politics and public policy, using New York City as a case study in comparison with similar large cities in the U.S. and Europe to understand urban political mobilization, immigrant political incorporation, and the formation of governing coalitions. This work seeks to understand how urban policy decisions are made and what consequences they have for different groups and interests, particularly new immigrant groups.



He has authored or edited eighteen books on these subjects, most recently *Unsettled Americans: Metropolitan Context and Civic Leadership for Immigrant Integration* (Cornell University Press, 2016), co-edited with Manuel Pastor.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Adopted July 23, 2018

Purpose

The mission of the Urban Affairs Association (UAA) is as follows: The Urban Affairs Association is dedicated to creating interdisciplinary spaces for engaging in intellectual and practical discussions about urban life. Through theoretical, empirical, and action-oriented research, the UAA fosters diverse activities to understand and shape a more just and equitable urban world.

To sustain a space in which this mission can be fulfilled, all members of the Association, event participants, Association staff, and contracted vendors of the Association are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that affirms the worth, dignity, and respect of others present when at Association conferences or events. The following statements serve as a reminder of expected behavior and professional conduct at all Association events.

The Urban Affairs Association expects that all members, conference/event attendees, guests, and staff will:

1. Abide by norms of professional respect/conduct at all times;
2. Encourage others to abide by norms of professional respect/conduct;
3. Alert Association staff should you see a dangerous situation or someone in distress;
4. Report any incidence in which you as an individual believe that you have been subject to inappropriate or unprofessional behavior on the part of another person during a UAA conference or event.

Unacceptable behaviors at Urban Affairs Association gatherings include:

1. Any intimidating, harassing, demeaning, or derogatory speech or actions towards others that undermine principles of academic and professional exchange;
2. Identity-based attacks on the basis of gender, gender identity, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, ability, socioeconomic status, age, or religion that undermine principles of academic and professional exchange;
3. Recording or sharing others' intellectual property without their permission;
4. Sustained disruption of talks or events;
5. Intimidation, stalking, threats towards others, or assault;
6. Making false claims of inappropriate behavior against an event participant;
7. Physical touching, suggestive language, photographing, and/or videotaping of a conference or event attendee that violates the individual's right to privacy and respect;
8. Display, distribution, and/or affixing of unauthorized materials (e.g., advertisements, flyers) during a UAA conference or event without the express permission of UAA;
9. Promotion of services or products to attendees at UAA conferences or events without the explicit permission of UAA.

Application of the Code of Conduct

Each person who registers for a UAA event will be required to acknowledge and agree to abide by the Code of Conduct. If an individual is reported to be in violation of the Code, a formal investigation of alleged actions will be made by UAA. The alleged violator will be given an opportunity to give statements regarding any incident. Based on all statements and reports related to an alleged violation, UAA will determine if a violation has occurred. UAA reserves the right to take any and all appropriate actions to protect the safety and well-being of event participants.

Consequences of Violating the Code of Conduct

The Urban Affairs Association reserves the right to request that individuals who violate principles of the code of conduct leave the event. The Association also reserves the right to ban violators from future Association activities. At the discretion of the Association's Executive Director in consultation with the Governing Board Chair, violations may be reported to local authorities or to the violator's home institution.

Reporting and Accountability

Should you witness or experience behavior which runs counter to the principles in this code of conduct, please alert an Association staff member as soon as possible. In addition to contacting staff directly, an anonymous web form is available for reporting any issues of concern. Any information submitted via that form is only accessible by the Association's Executive staff and Governing Board officers. If you observe any individual experiencing an immediate threat or assault, please contact the authorities directly, alert event security or staff, and alert Association staff.

MODERATOR GUIDELINES

Moderator Role Summary: Moderators are primarily responsible for 1) introductions, 2) keeping the time, and alerting presenters of remaining minutes, and 3) managing the open discussion period. The role of the moderator is to manage the session. Do not use your role as an opportunity to make assessments of each presentation.

Panel Time Management

- Panel sessions are 90 minutes long.
- Within each session, approximately 15–20 minutes should be reserved for open discussion.
- In sessions with five presenters, each presenter is allotted 10 minutes.
- In sessions with three or four presenters, each presenter is allocated 12 minutes. Keep in mind that introductions and transitions between each speaker do take time (as much as 2–4 minutes).

Here are some helpful hints on how to be an effective session moderator.

1. BEFORE STARTING YOUR SESSION

- Arrive early. Arrive 10 minutes prior to the start of your session. If another session is wrapping up, please stand at the back of the room until the session ends.
- Add presentation slides to the computer. Ask each presenter to upload any PowerPoint files to the dedicated session room computer. Each session room is equipped with a screen, a laptop computer with PowerPoint software, and an LCD projector. A–V technicians will be on-call in the hotel during sessions.
- Locate time management signs. Check to make sure the time management signs are in the session room. If they are not, ask an audience member to go to the Registration Office to get a pair of signs.
- Start the session on time. Do not wait for a crowd to form.

2. MANAGING YOUR SESSION:

- Start the session on time. Please start your session at the official starting time.
- Retain paper order. Do not change the order of the papers listed in the conference program. Audience members often plan their arrival and departure based on the order listed in the program.
- Introduce the session by its title. You may make a simple statement regarding the main topics covered by the papers. Limit this statement to 1 minute.
- No discussion and questions between presentations. A few minutes lost between papers can create a time shortage for open discussion, or worse, may reduce the time available for the last presenter.
- Introduce the first speaker and that person's paper title.
- Note speaker's starting time and anticipated ending time.
- Give 5-Minute Warning: When 5 minutes remain, show the speaker the 5-minute warning sign.
- Give 1-Minute Warning: When 1 minute remains, show the speaker the 1-minute warning sign.
- Approach the speaker and show the expired sign when the speaker's allotted time has expired.
- Proceed to introduce the second speaker and follow the same instructions listed above.

3. MANAGING QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS (Q&A) SEGMENT

- Invite the audience to ask questions. Once all speakers have completed their presentations, invite the audience to ask questions. Note the time that the Q&A begins and when the session must conclude.
- Do not dominate the Q&A period by asking your questions first. Let the audience have the first chance to pose questions.
- If the Q&A discussion slows down, consider asking questions based on your own interpretation or interests.
- Leave time management signs in the room for the next session.




FIFTH FLOOR
